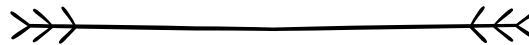

What type of crime victims do you assist?

All victims of crime are eligible for assistance through the Victim Assistance Department.

Crimes include but are not limited to: sexual assault, domestic violence, kidnapping, human trafficking, child abuse, hit & run, robbery, identity theft, etc.

Do I need to have a police report?

No. Whether a police report is filed or a suspect is found guilty does not impact your services at APDC.

How much do your services cost?

Services through the Victim Assistance Department at APDC are free. Outside service referrals may have associated costs depending on request.

Do I need to be Asian to receive the services?

No, the Victim Assistance Department will assist all victims of crime regardless of race, nationality, age, sexual identity, religion, gender identity, immigration status, and/or disability.
